In-home services, for eligible clients, include home care nursing, rehabilitation, home support and palliative care. Community-based services include adult day programs, meal programs, as well as assisted living, residential care services and hospice care. Case management services are provided in both the home and community.  Residential Care Facilities- provide accommodation, meals and care and supervision based on the person needs. There are a wide variety of settings where residential care is provided such as small home-like facilities for persons with physical or developmental disabilities, to large-scale facilities primarily for frail elderly seniors. Facilities that provide residential care to three or more persons must have a license, whether they receive funding (subsidized)

Further, a reintegration centre opened its doors in Inukjuak in 2000 and offers services to persons with major psychiatric problems. The region also has several community organizations that work in partnership with the regional board among various client groups, such as women, young persons and substance abusers
